


Searching for Closed Captioned Videos on YouTube

YouTube contains a wealth of educational content; however, auto-generated captions may not be accurate. To find videos on YouTube that were manually captioned or edited by the content creator, use the directions below. *Please note: Currently, YouTube does not have audio description (see page 15) capability. Keep this in mind when choosing videos to use for your courses.*


2. Enter your search word or phrase in the YouTube search text box (1), click on **Filters** (2), then click on **Subtitles** (3).
