## Apostrophes

The apostrophe is primarily used in the following cases: (1) to show someone or something has or possesses something and (2) to show contraction/omission of letters.

Has/possesses: Rick's ball is bouncy. (Rick owns/has the ball)

Contraction: I don't like you. (don't contracted from do and not)

To determine if you need to form the possessive, rearrange the words as an "of the" phrase.

Example: the boy's hat = the hat of the boy

Example: three days' journey = journey of three days

Another way to determine whether you need an apostrophe is to see if you can **substitute a possessive pronoun** (his, her, its, their) for the noun in question. If you can, you NEED the apostrophe.

Example: the boy's hat = his hat Example: my library's policy = its policy

## **Tricky Apostrophe Concepts**

1. Distinguish between *it's* and *its*, *who's* and *whose*. It's = it is (it's a contraction).

There is no such word as its'. *Its* is possessive, like *his* or *hers*. *Who's* is a contraction of who is and *whose* shows possession (whose ball is that?)

2. Distinguish between plural and possessive. Three teachers live down the street = plural (more than one teacher). The three teachers' houses reek = possessive (more than one of the teachers has/possesses a reeking house).

3. Some words form their plural irregularly. In most cases, we add —s or —es to indicate plural. Singular words such as *child* and *woman* become *children* and *women*.

4. Never use an apostrophe in a possessive pronoun (his, our, their) to show possession. These words exist to show possession, so don't add apostrophes to them.

Example: her's house= INCORRECT. Her house=CORRECT

5. It's standard NOT to use apostrophes next to words such as cds or next to multiple letters (there are three ps in the words pepper). So don't use apostrophes here since you are showing plural, NOT possessive. You should, however, use apostrophes when abbreviating dates. 1968 = 68.2021 = 21
