DEFINITIONS, LAWS AND POLICIES

Suffolk County Community College is dedicated to fostering and maintaining a safe, accessible, diverse and inclusive environment. <u>College policies</u> and federal and state law prohibit all forms of discrimination. Sexual harassment is a form of sex discrimination and harassment on the basis of sex. This includes, but is not limited to, acts of:

- sexual violence
- stalking
- domestic violence
- dating violence

- quid pro quo harassment
- hostile environment harassment
- sexual threats or intimidation
- sexual coercion

sexual assault

These can be verbal, non-verbal, physical, written or electronic (text or social media) and may be committed by or against any individual, regardless of gender, sexual orientation or gender identity. It includes discrimination based on perceived identity, pregnancy, and sex stereotypes. The college has a duty to respond promptly and equitably to complaints of sex discrimination and sexual harassment, to limit the effects of discrimination and to prevent its recurrence.

We understand that this can be difficult to discuss. Anyone who experiences, observes or hears about an incident that may reasonably constitute sex discrimination has the responsibility to report it to the Title IX Coordinator.

<u>**Title IX**</u> it is a federal law that protects all students, employees, vendors, visitors, volunteers and guests of Suffolk County Community College from sex discrimination, sexual harassment and all forms of sexual violence. Title IX applies to all schools that receive federal financial assistance.

<u>Article 129-B/"Enough is Enough"</u> Is a New York State law that requires all colleges and universities to adopt uniform response policies and procedures relating to sexual assault, domestic/dating violence and stalking and to provide students support on and off campus.

<u>College policies on sex discrimination</u> cover all educational programs and activities at the college, including admissions, financial aid, scholarships, funding, academic programs, research, career guidance, counseling, support services, athletics (including club or intramural), student clubs and organizations, campus activities, employment and training for students, faculty and staff. No person shall be excluded from participation in or be denied the benefits of any education program or activity on the basis of sex.

The college has a <u>Sexual Violence Response Policy</u> that includes information on how to report, resources, protection, accommodations and the conduct process. All students have a <u>Student Bill of Rights</u> related to sexual violence reports.

HOW DOES THE COLLEGE HELP VICTIMS?

If you are a victim of sexual violence, the college has a team ready to help you. This includes the <u>Title IX Coordinator and</u> <u>Deputy Coordinators, Public Safety</u>, and <u>Student Affairs</u>. The Title IX Coordinator oversees the complaint and grievance procedure, answers questions, provides information to you about your rights, shares resources, and offers reasonable interim supportive measures, such as a change in schedule, a no-contact order or other actions on a case-by-case basis. Retaliation against anyone who reports an incident or participates in the investigative process is prohibited. The college ensures respectful treatment and equitable access to resources for all parties involved

REPORTING A COMPLAINT

You have the right to make a report to Public Safety, local law enforcement, and/or State Police, or to choose not to report; to report the incident to the college; to be protected by the college from retaliation for reporting an incident; and to receive assistance, support and resources from the college.

- There are certain immediate steps that may be taken to help you feel safe, and you may change your mind about participating in the process at any time.
- <u>Contact Public Safety</u> at any time by calling (631) 451-4242 or 311 from any college phone.

- It is the policy of the college to protect the confidentiality of those involved in a complaint. There are confidential reporting options outlined in the **Options for Confidentially Disclosing Sexual Violence Policy.**
- There are significant differences between the college disciplinary process and the criminal justice process. For a summary of these differences in plain language see the **SUNY Criminal vs. Disciplinary Process Comparison**.
- For student complaints against another student report to the Campus Associate Dean of Student Services/Deputy Title IX Coordinator at each campus. Procedures are outlined in the <u>Student Handbook</u> and <u>Student Code of Conduct</u>.
- For student complaints against a college employee, visitor, volunteer or guest report to the <u>Title IX Coordinator</u> at 631-451-4950.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE A VICTIM OF SEXUAL VIOLENCE/ASSAULT

- Get to a safe place. For example, someone's home, the nearest hospital or police precinct.
- Call 911 to be taken to an emergency room for medical care and/or for immediate police protection and assistance. Tell
 the 911 operator what has happened and request to be sent to a Sexual Assault Forensic Examiner (SAFE) program. SAFE
 services provide specialized care and victim-centered approaches for sexual assault patients. Within 96 hours of an assault,
 you can get a SAFE examination. You will receive a complete medical evaluation, including a physical examination,
 treatment, evidence collection and counseling. In Suffolk County, examinations are available at Centers at Good Samaritan
 University Hospital, Stony Brook Medicine, Long Island Community Hospital and Peconic Bay Medical Center. Law
 enforcement personnel can take a formal report at the hospital.
- Preserve physical evidence. If at all possible, do not bathe, change clothing, throw any clothes away, use the restroom or brush your teeth. This is important for the evidence collection process that will occur at the hospital.
- Talk to someone you trust and seek counseling. The Campus Mental Health Coordinators can refer you to agencies and advocates that can discuss your options and provide services. Victims of a sexual assault often feel guilt, anger, fear or grief. Trained professionals will help you deal with the physical and psychological trauma that you have experienced. Medical services are also provided through Student Health Services. All identifying information is confidential.

FILING A CRIMINAL COMPLAINT Contact the Police by calling 911

Suffolk County Community College strongly recommends that all crimes be reported to local law enforcement. It is critical that all information and evidence be obtained as soon as possible. Victims do not need to make the decision to press charges at the time of the report. Victims have the right to file a criminal complaint with local Police precincts
